# WHAT IS A WILY SCHOLAR?

Wily Scholars are bright and hardworking students who are navigating college on their own. They manage their own academic and financial lives, make their own career and life choices, secure their own year-round housing, and work to provide themselves with food, books, clothing, and other essentials.

# WHAT DOES THE WILY NETWORK DO?

The Wily Network provides a support system from orientation through graduation by connecting Wily Scholars to a caring and consistent coach who will walk by their side, the resources to ensure a college experience commensurate with that of their peers, and other students and volunteers who understand their story and care about them.

Wily Scholars have experienced foster care, homelessness, or parents who are challenged by addiction, incarceration, or mental health issues. Unlike the majority of their peers, they are attending college without a safety net.



Daniel F. Chambliss is the Eugene M. Tobin Distinguished Professor of Sociology at Hamilton College, and coauthor, with his former student Chris Takacs, of *How College Works*. In 1991 Chambliss's book *Champions: The Making of Olympic Swimmers*, was named "Book of the Year" by the U.S. Olympic Committee, and he

has received the American Sociological Association's Theory section prize for his work on organizational excellence. In 1998, he won the ASA's Eliot Freidson prize for his book *Beyond Caring: Hospitals, Nurses, and the Social Organization of Ethics.* He is also co-author, with Russell Schutt, of *Making Sense of the Social World*, a research methods text currently in its fifth edition.

In 2014 Harvard University Press named *How College Works* as winner of the Virginia and Warren Stone Prize as the Press's book of the year on Education and Society. *How College Works* was also chosen as the *Chronicle of Higher Education*'s featured Book Club Selection for September-August 2014, named to the *Chronicle*'s "Top Ten Books on Teaching" for the year, and listed in the *Washington Post*'s "Summer Reading List for College Counselors," as well as being featured in a half-page interview in the *New York Times*' special Education Life section.



# How College Works by Dan Chambliss

Constrained by shrinking budgets, can colleges do more to improve the quality of education? And can students get more out of college without paying higher tuition?

How College Works reveals the surprisingly decisive role that personal relationships play in determining a student's collegiate success, and puts forward a set of small, inexpensive inter-

ventions that yield substantial improvements in educational outcomes.

At a liberal arts college in New York, the authors followed a cluster of nearly one hundred students over a span of eight years. The curricular and technological innovations beloved by administrators mattered much less than the professors and peers whom students met, especially early on. At every turning point in students' undergraduate lives, it was the people, not the programs, that proved critical. Great teachers were more important than the topics studied, and even a small number of good friendships—two or three—made a significant difference academically as well as socially.

For most students, college works best when it provides the daily motivation to learn, not just access to information. Improving higher education means focusing on the quality of a student's relationships with mentors and classmates, for when students form the right bonds, they make the most of their education.

The Wily program offers weekly coaching, financial assistance, community-building support, and networking opportunities to help them move from surviving to thriving.
